A Supporting Community Community Service Club Partners with Newbury Parish Church

morning last Saturday, students from Triton's Community Service Club gathered at the high school to collect and organize donations for their annual "Spirit Week: Stuff-a-Bus."

"We have been doing Stuff-a-Bus for four years now," said Community Service Club Co-Advisor, Ms. Theresa Karol.

"All four years, the Newbury Food Pantry has been a beneficiary from that, and the last three years they have been the sole beneficiary from our Stuff-a-Bus."

As the holidays peek around the corner, families gather for the celebration of this festive season. The Newbury Parish Food Pantry, established Dec. 11, 2015, is there to support families throughout the local communities however they can, said members.

"We gave out turkeys for Thanksgiving," said Jane Merrow, food pantry director. "We put food in 311 households, serving over 750 individuals."

The pantry first started after the closing of the Methodist Church and food pantry in Rowley. Workers from that pantry were in search for new sources to pick back up with the program.

"None of the other churches had any room," said Merrow, "so I thought we could put it in the library of our little church." After getting permission, the pantry was relocated to the Newbury Parish Church.

"We had one guest come," said Merrow of that first year, "and we had three volunteers ready to help them." The program continued to grow over the years and reached a peak when the pandemic started in March, 2020.

"We went from serving 150 people to 300 overnight," said Merrow. "We started to give out pieces of paper to show what was available to order, until we developed an online ordering system."

As the church started to reopen for in-person services after the pandemic, the pantry took refuge in the garage of a family in Newbury. "A family in Newbury let us use their garage," said Merrow. "We were there for about 11 months." The 40x60ft building now known as the "Newbury Food Pantry" was constructed during that time frame.

"Because we are 100 percent volunteer and no one gets paid," said Merrow, "the whole building is paid for, we have no mortgage on it." The Newbury Food Pantry serves seven towns within the community, and recently started adding smaller pantries in schools within the Triton School District.

The Community Service Club at Triton has found large success with raising and donating food to help the pantry, as they raised 1,500 lbs of food during this week alone. That all started with Karol raising food for the Rowley food pantry.

"I was working with the Rowley Food Pantry," said Karol, "and they weren't getting any donations, so I did a small one at my house... And my entire living room was full of food."

Getting two carloads from a canned food drive from Pine Grove Elementary School would be the very start of what is now known as "Stuff-a-Bus" here at the high school.

"The Newbury food pantry really brings in a sense of community," said Karol. "It happens here in our community and shows the kids that some of us are extremely fortunate to never have food insecurities, while others are in a very difficult spot. And (it) really opens their eyes to everybody in our community."

Active members of the club are exposed to many different opportunities, and students at THS find enjoyment in giving back to the community, they said.

Preventing Vending Machine Theft Inside Triton's Battle Against Student Lunch Code Fraud

Fueled By Lactose: Senior Noah Alcaraz & the Milk Mile

Nothing like a cold box of lactose to fuel the one and only Milk Mile, he thinks. This annual tradition will reign on with the support of fellow students, and just maybe the challenge will expand along towards other districts. The Milk Mile is what some call an unstoppable trend performed by senior Noah Alcaraz. It is a task that involves no prior training up until the day it is performed. Alcaraz sets apart a time during school hours to get a camera crew to follow him outside, where he begins chugging. In past experiences, Alcaraz has chosen to down eight full school milks which fueled him for the hard mile to come. He has done his run in numerous seasons, including the dead of winter where two feet of snow blanketed the track. 'To me the Milk Mile means absolutely nothing, but I had this idea that it was possible, and I wanted to push the human limits," claims Alcaraz. As a previous track athlete, Alcaraz has spent considerable time running. He notes that creating the challenge was a spurof-the-moment thing, and decided to film all of the completed runs. Posting them on social media, Alcaraz got minimal views, but he was still motivated to keep hustling. Running this exotic sprint has typically been done solo by Mr. Alcaraz, but there is hope that it will spread to the student

body here at Triton. Senior Class Officer Cam Neary is in full support of widening the awareness of the Milk Mile, sharing, "Personally, I have been pushing for the Milk Mile to become part of the track and field experience. Forget running, jumping, and throwing, I want to see the best and brightest chuggers that Triton has to offer." The Milk Mile is a unique style of motivation, not only for the runner, but for its viewers. Senior Nate Reily, who has watched Alcaraz run first-hand, was able to rekindle his excitement and passion for photography with the recurring Milk Mile, sharing that just the look on Alcaraz's face was enough to gain anticipation for the next run. Some may be wondering, why milk? Alcaraz claims that milk is the ideal beverage as it "is the most readily available on the Triton campus." As much as Alcaraz enjoys chugging lactose-based beverages, he has also been fueled by a dozen apple cider donuts, claiming, "I also dabbled in the Donut Mile, twelve donuts vs. one mile." Being one of the hardest runs that he has completed, Alcaraz is eager to challenge himself. Chaos & The Dogs: Released a Week Apart, Drake & Ken Carson Albums Compete

Carson's 'A Great Chaos' Tops Previous Albums

When artist Playboi Carti and his labelmates announced their "ANTAGONIST" arena tour, it seemed like Carti's record label Opium was in hibernation. Only artist Destroy Lonely had dropped tracks, leaving fans bewildered, especially after Ken Carson made a July album announcement that vanished into thin air.

With the beginning of the tour creeping up, Carson finally pulled back the curtain on his third studio album, *A Great Chaos*, released October 13. This revelation alone sent fans into a frenzy, even though Carson had teased them before. Anticipation swelled as tantalizing snippets emerged, each offering a glimpse into the upcoming chaos.

A day before the release however, the whole album unexpectedly leaked online, leaving fans skeptical of yet another delay. Hours away from the scheduled drop, Carson stayed mum. But when the clock struck 12, salvation arrived, and the LP burst onto all streaming platforms, giving fans the chaotic thrill they had been waiting for.

The essence of *A Great Chaos*, residing on major streaming platforms such as Apple Music, is simple yet powerful — it's designed to incite a continuous mosh pit, creating a tense and aggressive atmosphere that mirrors the chaotic energy of Carson's live shows.

This album stands out as the most explosive release of the year, featuring a variety of beats from producers such as F1LTHY, Starboy, Lil 88, and even Carson himself. F1LTHY's influence, as a member of the "Working On Dying" collective, is prominent throughout. This persona particularly shines on tracks like "Green Room" and "Succubus," showcasing intricate production that sets

this album apart from Carson's previous works. The combination of Carson's nasal delivery with the raw production results in a unique, sonic experience.

Carson's lyricism is characterized by catchy punchlines and aggressive bars, maintaining a consistent style with previous projects, notably *Project X*. While the wordplay may not be groundbreaking, the growth in this department is evident, especially in tracks like "Green Room." The album features collaborations with similar artists Destroy Lonely and Lil Uzi Vert, highlighting Carson's versatility in adopting different rap styles. Standout tracks like "Jennifer's Body" and "Nightcore" boast remarkable flows, bending and twisting the typical sonic rhythms associated with hip-hop.

The album can be likened to the *American Psycho* of music, not catering to everyone, but deeply loved by those who appreciate its eccentricity. Each song feels like an exploration of different dimensions, offering a multifaceted experience within a single track.

After thorough listening and research, Carson's *A Great Chaos* stands out as an aboveaverage project, surpassing his previous works. The album, ranging between a high 7.5 to a solid 8, owes much of its appeal to the electric production. While the album's vocal performances contribute significantly, it's the production that elevates it to a unique status. Despite occasional lyrical ambiguity, the overall impact of the album is undeniable, cementing Ken Carson's place in the realm of rage trap and hip-hop.

'For All The Dogs' Not For All People

Aubrey Graham, famously known as Drake, dropped his eighth studio album, For All The Dogs, on October 6. This release is part of a "trilogy of albums," as Drake described them. This project followed his preceding albums, Certified Lover Boy (2021) and Honestly, Nevermind (2022). Drake did not receive the best of reviews on this new album, but it couldn't have been that bad, as it hit number one on the U.S. Billboard 200. Fellow Assistant Principal, Mrs. Elizabeth Pacheco, appeared equally resolute, stating, "It's not right — it's theft, it's deception."

In response, administrators have been proactive. They've taken several measures to curb this issue. Surveillance cameras now keep an eye on the cafeteria, capturing culprits in the act. As a result, disciplinary action has been taken against many students. Football players, in particular, have felt the brunt of the school's response, due to their major role in the situation. Not only did they lose playing privileges, but they were assigned mandatory Saturday school.

School Resource Officer John Lucy weighed in, stating "It's the high school version of credit card fraud. If you don't deal with the smaller crimes, then you are more likely to have bigger crimes."

Administrators say the issue may seem small, but it touches upon a deeper concern for Triton High School. It challenges the principles of honesty and community that the school seeks to instill in students. Although the stolen amounts are relatively small, the consequences are far-reaching and administrators are asking for students help ending the problem. who would, as he realizes how impressive it is that Alcaraz can "drink all that milk and still run farther than the average person".

The future of the Milk Mile is continuously evolving and Alcaraz expects a new one to be run this year. His message to the student body: "There might be a new Milk Mile dropping this year, stay tuned."
