During a new year with many new faces, Ms. Stephanie Quinn is one at Salisbury Elementary who has a bright smile and warming presence that she brings with many new strengths for her 5th grade class.

But she is not alone. The 5th grade team is full of fresh faces all from different areas of the school, and they are all navigating this year together. Quinn's teaching story is one that began at young age, when she first knew she wanted to work with kids.

"At family parties and cookouts, I was always watching the younger cousins," she said

But what really made her want to become a teacher was her younger brother who was diagnosed with Aspergers Syndrome when they were kids. Growing up, she looked after him, and in a way, coached him throughout his school career, and she realized that the help for kids with special needs was sparse. Quinn knew that special education was where she wanted to start her career.

She earned her bachelor's degree in special education teaching at the University of South Florida and then went on to get her master's degree at Cambridge College in Boston. After graduating with her master's, she was a long-term substitute teacher at a middle school in Boston, which is where she really fell in love with teaching. Later on, she became a special education teacher at one of Triton's neighboring schools.

"Unfortunately, I didn't have a welcoming experience, and it is unfortunate," she said of her time at that school.

Over the summer, Quinn had an interview with some of the returning SES staff. There, she spoke with her nowmentor Ms. Molly Donovan, who had great things to say about Quinn.

"She was a no-brainer," said Donovan. "She has great experience already, and with her background in special education, she adds great skills to the 5th grade team." Donovan expressed how awesome it was to have the opportunity to hire someone for their team with such amazing experience and patience.

Quinn has exciting plans for this year and her students appear to share that enthusiasm.

"ELA is my favorite subject," said one student "She [Quinn] helps me write paragraphs."

"My favorite thing about her class was learning about the BC and BCE," said another student.

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but this isn't her first time in this community.

"I lived in Byfield as a little kid," said Kretsch. "It's kind of nice being in an area where I'm working with people and making those connections again. It's like being home."

Scott said that one of those connections happened recently with long-time substitute Mrs. Nancy Reusch. Reusch's daughter, Jessica, a third grade teacher at Pine Grove Elementary used to dance at the same studio with Kretsch.

"Mrs. Reusch stopped in and she was looking at Mrs. Kretsch and just knowing she was familiar."

Speidel has seen first-hand the outcomes of an apathetic educator. She hopes to right those people's wrongs. She has been teaching for 13 years, all of which out of a cart in Gloucester Elementary.

The dedication to teaching has never left her soul, and the lack of experience in her own classroom did not hold Speidel back. Today, her room is filled with colorful instruments and resources for each student.

Additionally, Speidel is an advanced band member, dating back to the fourth grade. However, she has reverted to the basics for her younger children, teaching them how to differentiate their singing voices from their speaking ones.

While each class had only gotten to meet with Speidel twice before this interview was conducted, a few students reported that she's "very nice," and they're excited for the remainder of the year.

Speidel has had Mrs. Deborah MacKinnon in her corner through the transition into the Triton community. MacKinnon is the band teacher for 5th and 6th grade at Salisbury Elementary, Newbury Elementary, and Pine Grove. She is also considered a mentor.

"Ms. Speidel comes to us with a lot of experience, and she has a lot of great ideas," said MacKinnon. "She has even taught me a few things already!" MacKinnon's interactions with Speidel have been limited, due to her bouncing around between the three schools. Nonetheless, she said Speidel is, "very passionate about teaching music and wants every student to have a positive experience in her classroom."

With such positive feedback from both students and fellow faculty, it is obvious Speidel has a lot to bring to the table. She and her students will soon be working towards their annual recitals in the winter and spring.
